In a recent newsletter mailed from Tech's College of Architecture and Urban Studies, Dean Charles W. Steger announced a competition which is open to alumni of the college. Following is the content of the announcement as it appears in the newsletter:

Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University is sponsoring an open competition for the design of a Student Services Building.

The estimated 21,000 sq. ft., 2.5 million dollar structure will serve as a comprehensive service facility to be located adjacent to Burruss Hall within the northwest quadrant of the campus. The building is to be con-sidered as part of the University's infill plan and, in that light, will serve as a link between Burruss and Pamplin Halls as well as providing some definition to the Cowgill Plaza. as will

All entries are due by 5:00 pm, Friday, September 2, 1983. The Awards Jury will convene on September 9. Winners will be notified immediately. Awards will be presented at a formal ceremony later in the Fall.

A panel of independent jurors will consist of nationally recognized practitioners and academicians.

Procurement regulations of the Commonwealth of Virginia for the employ-ment of Architectural and Engineering firms prohibit Virginia Tech from guaranteeing an award of contract. Virginia Tech employees and family are ineligible.

- to protect the historic content of Blacksburg through historical registration


Presently a historical case study of the Nelson Price house at 107 Wharton Street is underway, moving towards registration as a Blacksburg Historic Site District. The structure is a twostory, L-shaped frame home, built circa 1840. Originally a log cabin, additions have been made to the rear of the house, and the entire structure has been covered with weatherboarding.

This spring the Archi-Preservation committee sponsored a tour of Smithfield Plantation for the active brothers. The group has also begun to get involved with the New River Valley Chapter of the Archeological Society of Virginia as it looks into some possibilities of other areas of interest.


